He has a little room set up at grandma and grandpa's for when we are back in town between meetings. Everything seems to be going well, he and mom are healthy and, Lord willing, it will all go down uneventfully.

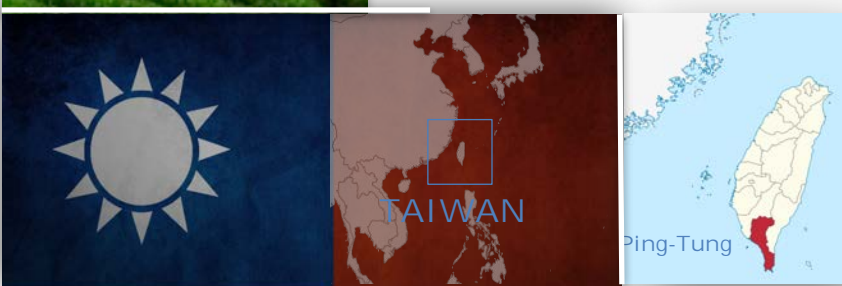
Our deputation process is at a critical stage now. We sit at 84%. All that remains is less than \$1000 to raise! My parents are due back to the States in September for a furlough. We have an updated prayer request: We hope to have our funds fully in by mid July, and have a date in August we want to depart for Taiwan. Crunching the numbers, it will be humanly impossible to raise the rest in just the next several *summer* months. We need God to accomplish this if He wills. We could really use the month between arriving in Taiwan and my parents departing to get settled in, and are feeling the pressure. Would you pray we could be booked solidly with good meetings though it is the slower summer months? Would you pray the rest of our support would come in in time so that we could go fully supported? In the meantime, we have a lot of lengthy paperwork and visas to get done before that date is here, both for ourselves and also for Logan. It seems a good timeframe to get his shots all in order too.

There have been several churches recently that have blessed us above and beyond recently. We have finances for plane tickets and for birth expenses for Logan, which will be a lot out of pocket due to insurance. Praise the Lord! Thank you for all your support and prayers for us.

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Some delicious seafood fried rice and ginger clam soup. This soup in a lot of ways is like "chicken noodle soup." It can be found just about everywhere and is very commonly ordered when eating out as a group. Note the trashbag-like tablecloth that can be easily removed and replaced between customers if need be. Disposable bamboo chopsticks, and little plastic bowls and soup spoons are also furnished. We were treated to delicious sweet and sour fish that, as you can see, we promptly finished off (middle of picture).



At the entrance to one mountain village, near the Aboriginal Culture Park, is a beautiful wall showing the sacred 100 pacer snake, guardian spirit of the Rukai and Paiwan tribes. They are protecting ancestral urns, as the ancestors were not just protected in this life, but in the process of going to the next as well. Metal (I think) Hunters and their indigenous mountain dogs take to the jungle trails in a hunt for wild boar above this wall. The tribal people are so extremely artistic when working with wood and stone especially! Everywhere through the mountains you will see intense pride in their people, way of life, and history.
